YEAR 6 CANBERRA CAMP

The Year 6 students from St Patrick's have recently undertaken an education tour of the national capital, Canberra. Students had the opportunity to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy. We visited Parliament House, the Australian War Memorial, Old Parliament House and the A.N.Z.A.C. Parade Walk to name just a few. The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship Education. To assist

families in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government is contributing funding of \$45 per student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program towards those costs. The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.

Education In Faith

How do you explain what Easter is really all about?

Easter is a celebration that came from Christianity. It marks the celebration of the day that Christians believe Jesus was resurrected. Most people don't know that word "resurrected", so you may share the story of how Jesus was <u>left in a cave</u> after he was taken down from a Cross, but when they rolled away the stone that was blocking the door, he was not inside! People believe he was brought back to life and returned to heaven.

Every major religion has some major celebration about the return or resurrection of spring with birth and renewal as a theme. It is also the time for Passover celebrations for the Jewish faith.

We must remember that Easter, and other words such as New Birth, New Life are all terms to help us understand the meaning of Spring. Spring is when Easter occurs in the Northern Hemisphere. Jerusalem and Rome are in the Northern Hemisphere. We, of course, in Australia celebrate Easter in Autumn.

To assist helping our young ones understand Easter the best method is to tell them the truth about the origins of Easter.

Easter is the most important day in the Christian calendar. It is the main religious feast in Christianity followed by Christmas. One cannot speak of Easter without speaking about Jesus Christ."

Easter can be a great opportunity to teach young people about other people's faiths. Whether one is religious or not, we have an important role in educating our children about world religions and cultural customs. Even if we don't believe the stories of the Bible, many still do the cultural customs as a tradition. Christmas was originally about the birth of Jesus — but many who do not believe in Jesus still have a tree and stockings and exchange gifts because it is a custom, not a religious practice. The same goes for Easter."

So if Easter is about Jesus' death and resurrection, then why do we have Easter eggs? Eggs are a sign of birth. Eggs are a sign of New Life! The Resurrection is about New Life

On another note: Did you know that when you are baptised you are not baptised into the Catholic Church, the Uniting Church or the Protestant Churches but that you are

Baptised: In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. By being Baptised in a Catholic Church you are intending to bring your child up as Catholic. You become a member of the Catholic Church by attending the Catholic Church and receiving the various sacraments within the Catholic Church.



A reflective story for this time of the year: Holy Week and Easter.

A wealthy man and his son loved to collect rare works of art. They had everything in their collection, from Picasso to Raphael. They would often sit together and admire the great works of art.

When the Vietnam conflict broke out, the son went to war. He was very courageous and died in battle while rescuing another soldier. The father was notified and grieved deeply for his only son.

About a month later, just before Christmas, there was a knock at the door. A young man stood at the door with a large package in his hands..

He said, 'Sir, you don't know me, but I am the soldier for whom your son gave his life. He saved many lives that day, and he was carrying me to safety when a bullet struck him in the heart and he died instantly... He often talked about you, and your love for art.' The young man held out this package. 'I know this isn't much. I'm not really a great artist, but I think your son would have wanted you to have this.'

The father opened the package. It was a portrait of his son, painted by the young man. He stared in awe at the way the soldier had captured the personality of his son in the painting. The father was so drawn to the eyes that his own eyes welled up with tears. He thanked the young man and offered to pay him for the picture. 'Oh, no sir, I could never repay what your son did for me. It's a gift.'

The father hung the portrait over his mantle. Every time visitors came to his home he took them to see the portrait of his son before he showed them any of the other great works he had collected.

The man died a few months later. There was to be a great auction of his paintings. Many influential people gathered, excited over seeing the great paintings and having an opportunity to purchase one for their collection.

On the platform sat the painting of the son. The auctioneer pounded his gavel. 'We will start the bidding with this picture of the son. Who will bid for this picture?'

There was silence...

Then a voice in the back of the room shouted, 'We want to see the famous paintings. Skip this one.'

But the auctioneer persisted 'Will somebody bid for this painting? Who will start the bidding? \$100, \$200?'

Another voice angrily. 'We didn't come to see this painting. We came to see the Van Gogh's, the Rembrandts. Get on with the Real bids!'

But still the auctioneer continued. 'The son! The son! Who'll take the son?'

Finally, a voice came from the very back of the room. It was the long-time gardener of the man and his son. 'I'll give \$10 for the painting...' Being a poor man, it was all he could afford.

'We have \$10, who will bid \$20?'

'Give it to him for \$10. Let's see the masters.'

The crowd was becoming angry They didn't want the picture of the son.

They wanted the more worthy investments for their collections.

The auctioneer pounded the gavel.. 'Going once, twice, SOLD for \$10!'

A man sitting on the second row shouted, 'Now let's get on with the collection!'

The auctioneer laid down his gavel. 'I'm sorry, the auction is over.'

'What about the paintings?'

'I am sorry. When I was called to conduct this auction, I was told of a secret stipulation in the will... I was not allowed to reveal that stipulation until this time. Only the painting of the son would be auctioned. Whoever bought that painting would inherit the entire estate, including the paintings.

The man who took the son gets everything!'

God gave His son over 2,000 years ago to die on the Cross. Much like the auctioneer, His message today is: 'The Son, the Son, who'll take the Son?'

Because, you see, whoever takes the Son gets everything!


